

Simple Steps to Living Sustainably Your ideas!

Following the article in the last Outlook on Simple steps to save energy and to keep warm here are some more ideas from SVB congregations, this time on how we can live more sustainably for the health of our planet



Travel

Don't take the car for those really short trips Avoid or reduce flying Bus, cycle or walk whenever possible.

Shopping

Use LOAF principle when shopping - Local, Organic, Animal friendly, Fairtrade Buy fruit and vegetables in season

Buy food only for immediate use (not too much that will be wasted)

Plan to cook extra meals or cakes at a time and freeze extra Reduce meat consumption to once or twice a week Avoid or reduce single use plastic wrapping where possible Use soap and shampoo bars – less plastic waste

Use refillable cleaning products

Choose natural fibres and recycle/repurpose as much as possible





Garden and wildlife

Leave parts of your garden to grow wild to increase wildlife Use less plastic and avoid peat.

Make a compost heap

Use toilet roll centres to make tubes for planting seeds by folding the bottom in (after making several cuts). You could use a spot of glue

Respect and care of our environment

We must make an attempt to preserve God's Creation in this our beautiful country and over all the world.

Ring for The King at Chipping Sodbury

At 3.00pm on Saturday 6th May after the flypast over Buckingham Palace had finished, 8 of the Chipping Sodbury bell ringers assembled in the tower to spend the next 30 minutes joining other ringers throughout the UK in ringing the 8 bells to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla. We rang what is known as Call Changes in which the bells are called by the Conductor, in



this case Tower Captain Dave Clark, to sound various sequences of bells, each of which has a name. On this special occasion, Dave ensured that we rang the two sequences, known as changes, called Kings and Queens. Since the Coronation took place in London, Dave also called the change Whittingtons, named after the former Mayor of London who allegedly heard the bells of London when he approached the city.

As with all the other ringing for the Coronation throughout the UK, the Chipping Sodbury performance will be published in the bell ringers' weekly newspaper and can be viewed on the paper's website Bellboard at:

The concert, A Spring Serenade, started in our traditional way of singing choral pieces such as a chorus from Handel's Messiah, and "Come Gentle Spring" by Haydn.

Not content with this wonderful selection of music, the programme also included a solo by Sian Walters singing Handel's "Where Ere You Walk" and one from Carol herself who sang an amusing piece from the musical "Kiss Me Kate", "I Hate Men". The concert also included a monologue, "Albert and the Privy" beautifully delivered with northern accent and comic timing by Jan Hazelby. The concert was rounded off by two verses of the National Anthem,

accompanied by the Brass Band, with the first verse sung in harmony by the choir and the audience joining in, having been given the words for both verses.
