

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
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A word from Jane

Dear friends

By the time this edition is published, we'll be well into Lent and turning our faces towards Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, followed by the awful days that followed as he turned to face the cross. Then the Resurrection. New life. New beginnings. New hope!

At the beginning of Lent, Rev. Chris and I attended the Bishop's Gathering in Gloucester, and as we drove, we talked about what we'd either given up or taken up for

Chipping Sodbury Bellringers Win the Stinchcombe Cup

On Saturday 1 March the Chipping Sodbury team of bellringers entered the annual 6-bell striking competition organised by the Wotton-under-Edge Branch of the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association of Church Bellringers. The competition was held at St Martin's Church, North Nibley. This is a lovely church in a beautiful setting overlooking the Severn Valley. At the time we went, the churchyard was covered in primroses.



A striking competition is an event in which teams of bell ringers compete against each other to ring the bells as accurately as possible avoiding mistakes, with the team making the least faults being declared the winners.

Four teams entered the competition this year – Dursley, Chipping Sodbury, North Nibley and Coaley – and the competition was judged by Tony Bulteel, a ringer at St Mary Redcliffe Church in Bristol. We rang 120 changes, known as a touch, of a method called Grandsire Doubles and were pleased to come second out of the four teams, thus winning the Stinchcombe Cup awarded to the runners up. The team from Dursley came first as they have done for a number of years. One day we may be able to beat them with a bit more practice!!

We ring for the Sunday morning services at Chipping Sodbury and also for other occasions such as the Remembrance Sunday Parade when the bells are half-muffled. We tolled a bell when Queen Elizabeth died and rang to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles.

We would welcome new ringers – either beginners or "returners". It's one of those things that, having learnt, you don't forget how to do however long the gap! You can start when you are tall enough to reach the bell rope or even leave it until you retire. Some ringers are still ringing in their 90s as it is a very good way to keep fit! 
'For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also'.


finally, children and adults together presented the dance taught during the day.

APRIL - Spend time in nature.

Helping special children in India

Arpana is a very special school in Bangalore, India, for children with special needs. It is a community with which we have had longstanding relations, thanks largely to diocesan connections through Revd Canon David Bowers, our former rector.

It is a happy place where young people receive education through loving care and attention during their formative years. They could very easily be marginalised because of their disabilities, but instead Mrs Saduri and her staff provide them with care and quality education and prepare them for skills they can take with them when they leave.

Children come from families of all religious backgrounds – whether Hindus, Muslims, or Christians, and there is no discrimination. And they all learn Bible verses together.

A team visited Arpana from SVB in 2019 and brought back reflections on their visit. They were impressed by the practical skills the children learn there. These include operating a simple printing press, and taking orders, e.g. for letterheaded notepaper, for the areas they come from.

Their funding comes through the Karnataka diocese of the Church of South India (CSI). The Gloucester diocese also channels funds to support this work. Locally Mrs Saduri, who is now past retirement age, works hard to maintain financial support, to publicise their work, and train staff. We receive reports from her regularly through our contact Tania Manners, and she much appreciates the prayer support we provide. She tells of how Arpana recently took part in a competition for special schools, organised by the Association of Christian Teachers. They were proud to be awarded first place in choreography and singing. They also organise special activities in local communities.

Kindly remember Mrs Saduri and her staff in your prayers. Frank Gray

Drawing Apart

Jesus loved to draw apart to be alone with God. For example, after feeding the 5000, which must have been quite a stressful situation for him, St. John records that he withdrew to a mountain by himself. This is a great example for us, his followers. We live in a very busy, noisy world. With all the pressures of life, including social media, how can we relate to God? What we call Prayer - communicating with God - can easily be squeezed out. In this febrile atmosphere, drawing apart to be with God is increasingly important for Christians.

We may have a favourite place to do this. Mine is the corner of my study/ bedroom, where I have a comfortable chair and can put the books I need on the bed in front of me. Of course, I have the luxury of being retired, as many of us church members are. But have we programmed this time of meeting with God into our day? Even when we are retired, there seems to be so much to do. However, for our peace of mind and heart, we all need to draw aside. If Jesus needed to do so, how much more do we! I suggest that in the remaining weeks leading up to Easter, and then in the



period after it when we are reminded of the Resurrection and the coming of the Holy Spirit, we might think about building a regular time of prayer into our day.

Even if you already have this worked out, maybe your routine could be improved or helpfully changed. I suggest that 10 minutes a day is a good starting-point, but it's amazing how quickly the time passes once you get going. In the next "Outlook", I'll make some suggestions about how the time can helpfully be spent, although I wouldn't claim to be an expert on prayer, and am myself learning and adapting all the time. If would be good to hear any helpful ideas that you might have.

Taizé-style Worship in the Sodbury Vale Benefice

What is Taizé?

The Taizé community– named after the small village of Taizé in central France – is an ecumenical monastic order of Roman Catholic and Protestant monks drawn from thirty countries across the world. It was founded by Brother Roger Schütz in 1940 to establish a place of peace and justice through prayer and meditation. The Church of Reconciliation was built there in



1962. Today it is a significant place of Christian pilgrimage and is a magnet for people of different cultures, traditions and ages, especially for thousands of young people who flock to the community each year to share in its way of life.

What are the key ingredients of Taizé-style worship?

- Welcome Taizé worship is open to everyone
- Music simple chants repeated to help with prayer and meditation
- Readings Bible or reflective readings
- **Silence** space for a period of silence is included in the service



Why offer this kind of worship?

To respond to the thirst and yearning from people for a more contemplative, flexible form of worship which has fewer words and more space for quiet reflection, lighting candles and joining in the chants with the Taizé Singers
